Mariano Croce and **Andrea Salvatore** teach Political Philosophy at Sapienza University of Rome. For some time now they have been engaged in a reinterpretation of Carl Schmitt's work, culminating in publications such as *The Legal Theory of Carl Schmitt* (Routledge, 2013), L'indecisionista. Carl Schmitt oltre l'eccezione (Quodlibet, 2020), and Carl Schmitt's Institutional Theory: *The Political Power of Normality* (Cambridge University Press, 2022).

Francesco Ferraro is Associate Professor of Philosophy of Law at the University of Milan. He is the author of three books and of book chapters and articles on Jeremy Bentham's thought and utilitarianism, on legal and moral rights, on legislative rationality and 'legisprudence', on nudging, and on the symbolic functions of law.
