

Sarah Songhorian has a Ph.D. in Cognitive Neuroscience and Philosophy of Mind at Vita-Salute San Raffaele University in Milan and at the Institute for Advanced Study in Pavia (IUSS). She defended a Dissertation on “Empathy, Sympathy, and Morality: An Interdisciplinary Approach”. She graduated in 2011 at Philosophy at Vita-Salute San Raffaele University in Milan on: “Sentire e agire. L’etica della simpatia tra sentimentalismo e razionalismo” (“Feeling and Acting. The Ethics of Sympathy between Sentimentalism and Rationalism”). Her research topic focuses on the possibility to find a relation between the concepts of “empathy”, as it is intended in recent neuroscientific analysis, and that of “sympathy”, as a normative foundation for a moral theory. She is member of CeSEP – Center for Public Ethics Studies – and of PERSONA – Laboratory for Research in Phenomenology and Sciences of the Person – at Vita-Salute San Raffaele University.
