

Daniela Bernaschi is an environmental and development economist with a PhD in Social and Political Change awarded jointly by the University of Florence and the University of Turin. Her research focuses on social inequalities, poverty and food insecurity. She is currently a research fellow at the Department of Political and Social Sciences at the University of Florence, and a researcher at CURSA's Observatory on Poverty and Food Insecurity in Rome. She is the Principal Investigator of the project "Food Insecurity in Affluent Societies: The Nutritional, Social and Emotional Dimensions of Capabilities and Agency Deprivation", funded through a competitive EU-funded scheme coordinated by the University of Florence. Among her publications are the book *Collective Actions of Solidarity Against Food Insecurity: The Impact in Terms of Capabilities* (Springer, 2020), and the article "Food Insecurity and Changes in Social Citizenship: A Comparative Study of Rome, Barcelona and Athens", co-authored with Laura Leonardi and published in 2023 in *European Societies*, which was awarded runner-up for best article (2021–2024) by the European Sociological Association (ESA).

Carlo Cafiero is a senior statistician and economist at the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) in Rome, Italy, where he leads the team in charge of producing food security and nutrition statistics at global, regional, and country levels and is the FAO focal point for the food security indicators used to monitor SDG Target 2.1. Prior to joining FAO in 2011, he taught statistics, agricultural economics and policy at the Graduate school of Agriculture at the University of Naples Federico II, Italy. His research interests have covered risk management in agriculture, the econometrics of storable commodity prices and, more recently, measure-

ment issues in the fields of food security and nutrition. He holds a PhD in agricultural and natural resource economics from the University of California at Berkeley, a Doctoral degree in agricultural policy from the University of Naples Federico II, Italy and a MS in agricultural economics from the University of Arizona.

Giulia Ciancimino is Research Fellow at the Institute for Research on Population and Social Policies of the National Research Council of Italy (CNR-IRPPS) and PhD candidate in Sociology at Roma Tre University. Her research focuses on population attitudes and behaviours, social and educational inequalities, social justice, and youth relational and psychological well-being, combining qualitative and quantitative approaches. She has contributed to several national and international research projects and authored articles in international peer-reviewed journals.

Francesca Cerutti is a Post-doc fellow and Teaching Assistant at the University of Milan, Department of International and Legal Studies. Her research focuses on non-proliferation regimes and International Organizations, specifically on CBRN and health security interface regimes' complex dynamics (threats, stakeholders, and governance). She teaches International Relations classes to master's students and collaborate with the courses in Security Studies, Foreign Policy Analysis, and Geopolitics. Her publications include peer-reviewed original research, book chapters and newspaper articles. She worked as a consultant at WHO HQ (World Health Emergency) in 2017 and covered visiting scholar positions at the Graduate Institute in Geneva and Duke University in 2015-2016. Prior to her doctoral studies, she served as project manager, outreach officer and expert at Luigi Sacco University Hospital BSL4 Laboratory within the framework of the Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear Centre of Excellence Initiative; she was responsible for implementing training on biosafety and biosecurity in Italy and the field: SouthEast Asia (Philippines, Singapore, Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, Thailand, Myanmar, Brunei) and Caucasus (Georgia). She holds a bachelor's degree in International Science and European Institutions Studies and a MA in International Relations, both honoured *cum laude*.

Francesca Benedetta Felici, Anthropologist and Ph.D. candidate at the University of Rome La Sapienza, she has been working for years on food systems and the right to food. She has worked at various universities and international research centers. Among the topics she addresses, we find ur-

ban food policies and food poverty. Her current doctoral project addresses the right to food in the context of public food procurement, with a specific focus on food in Italian prisons. She collaborates with the Observatory on Food Insecurity and Poverty at CURSA and is a consultant at the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO).

Franca Maino is an Associate Professor in the Department of Social and Political Sciences at the University of Milan and serves as the Scientific Director of Percorsi di secondo welfare. She also holds the position of President of the Fondazione Ufficio Pio in Turin. Her main research interests include the welfare state and comparative social policy, with a focus on recent welfare transformations, the role of non-public actors, and policies aimed at combating poverty.

Davide Marino is Professor of Economics and Rural Assessment at the University of Molise, teaches "Food Policy" and "Environmental Accounting and Ecosystem Services". Lecturer in Food and Wine Sciences in Rome 3 University, where he teaches "The Agro-food Made in Italy". Member of the Doctoral College in "Models for Economics and Finance" of La Sapienza University in Rome. He represents the University of Molise in the Group "Food" in the Network of Sustainable Universities (RUS). He is a member of GDL2 - Hun-

gry - of ASVIS (Italian Alliance for Sustainable Development). Scientific coordinator of the Food Atlas and Food Plan within the Metropolitan Strategic Plan (PSM) for the Metropolitan City of Rome Capital. He is coordinator of several national and international research projects on urban agriculture, agricultural landscape, biodiversity, ecosystem services and environmental accounting.

Roberto Sensi is a policy expert at ActionAid Italy, where he coordinates the organization's work on tackling food poverty. He has authored several reports on the multidimensional measurement of the phenomenon and on policy responses, with a particular focus on approaches developed in high-income countries. His work explores the nexus between the right to food, food security, and inequalities, with the aim of promoting systemic strategies through research, analysis, advocacy, and by strengthening the role of local and national actors.
