## **GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS**

Languages for publication: italian, english and french.

**Publication Frequency**: 3 issues per year

**Peer Review**: All research articles in this journal undergo rigorous peer review, based on initial editor screening and anonymized refereeing by up to two specialist referees.

Submission of a manuscript does not imply commitment to publish in the journal. Authors submitting manuscripts to the journal should not simultaneously submit them to another journal, nor should manuscripts have been published elsewhere in substantially similar form or with substantially similar content. Queries concerning what constitutes prior publication should be addressed to the editor.

Manuscripts that do not meet the submission standards will not be considered. Manuscripts that pass the Editor's initial screening are sent, still anonymized, for double-blind review to two outside reviewers.

Authors must **prepare and submit two separate files** - (.doc or .docx) - to Bdl via the submission website (a registration to the website is required):

- (1) One 'Main Document' which contains only your anonymized manuscript
- (2) One 'Cover File' which includes:
- a title page with full contact information,
- a brief biographical paragraph noting current affiliation, research interests, and recent publications
- an abstract of 150-300 words, and five keywords to facilitate electronic access.

N.B.: The supplementary information should be provided in English (regardless of the language of the manuscript).

The **standard length** for articles is between 6,000 and 8,000 words, although longer articles may sometimes be accepted.

Font: Garamond, 12, single space.

Quotation are between "" and single terms or expressions you wish to underline are in '.

Words in other languages must be in *italic*.

Notes superscripts in the text should be always **after** punctuation marks and should be indicated with superscript numbers running consecutively through the text.

BDL uses a "**Harvard-style**" referencing system. References or citations should therefore be indicated within the text, with a full listing of all cited references collected at the end of the article. Please avoid citation inflation, and give precise page references when appropriate. For example: Huntington 2004; Rajan and Zingales 2003; Rawls 1971, 27-30.

Use *et al*. when citing a work by more than two authors, but use all authors' names in the listing of cited works at the end of the paper.

The letters a, b, c, ... should be used to distinguish citations of different works by the same author in the same year.

## References

All references cited in the text should be listed alphabetically and – when of the same author – in chronological order.

All the references in Harvard style in the text should be quoted in the final list of references and, reverse, all the texts in the listing should be quoted in the text in Harvard style.
