Round table discussion on the occasion of the publication of the volume “*Manlio Brosio: NATO Diaries 1964-1972*”, published by the Centro Einaudi with the support of Compagnia di San Paolo. Manlio Brosio was an Italian lawyer, diplomat, politician and the fourth Secretary General of NATO between 1964 and 1971.

As NATO has entered its seventh decade, questions loom large about its mission in today's world. While most would say that it is the most successful collective security alliance in history, NATO faces a myriad of challenges. Among the most critical of these are Afghanistan, NATO-Russia relations, NATO-EU relations, and implementing smart-defense. Meanwhile the financial crisis continues to test the political will and budgetary ability of NATO countries to cooperate. Manlio Brosio's account of a very significant and volatile period in NATO's history will be a starting point for our reflection on today's problems and future strategies.
